## Scholastic Book Fair Set for November

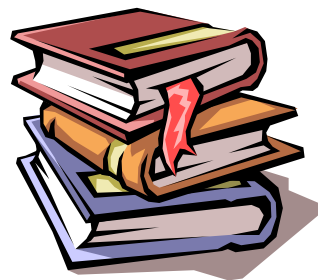
